It is vital to our quality of life, no matter what our age. Today we focus on a few things that will help us achieve this goal. This information comes from the publication, familydoctor.org. First of

all it is important to eat a healthy diet. If you are going to eat fats, and some fats are actually good for you, choose monounsaturated fats such as olive oil and canola oil. Polyunsaturated fats such as those found in nuts and seeds and omega-3 fats like those found in fish. Choose whole grain breads rather that white bread. Try baking, broiling, or roasting meats These are the healthiest ways to cook meats. Dry beans, peas and lentils contain protein and fiber. Choose low fat versions of dairy products, and eat no more than four egg yolks a week.

Exercise is also very important to a healthy heart. It

makes your heart stronger which helps it to pump more blood with each heartbeat. It also helps to lower blood pressure and reduce bad cholesterol which can cause a stroke. Exercise can raise levels of good cholesterol which helps protect against a heart attack.. Aerobic exercises are the best type of exercise to strengthen your heart. These include walking, running, swimming, dancing and bicycling. It is good to work out up to 30 minutes four to six times a week. Now you are all pre-
